### Organizing Authority

The Hobie Class Association of North America (HCA-NA), HCA Division 2 and Hobie Fleet 88

### Venue & Dates

The venue for all classes will be in Lake Havasu City, across the London Bridge, on The Island. Hobie Tiger, FX-One, 20, 18, 17 and Waves will launch off the Crazy Horse Campground beach area and race in the North Basin of Lake Havasu. All other classes will launch off the Rotary Park beach and race in the South Basin of Lake Havasu. All races will be held Monday, November 9th through Friday, November 13th, 2009.

### Rules

The event will be governed by the 2009-2012 ISAF Racing Rules of Sailing, as prescribed by US SAILING, the 2009 IHCA Class Rules, the Hobie 16 Trapseat Rules and this Notice of Race except as modified by the Sailing Instructions. RRS 44.1 (Penalties at the Time of an Incident) will be changed so a one turn penalty shall be required for a breach of Part 2 rules. Hobie Wave NAC Class will be governed by the IWCA class rules.

### Eligibility

The ISAF Competitors' Eligibility Code Applies (ISAF Regulation 19) for ISAF International Classes. All skippers and crew participating in North American Championship Classes must be paid members of the HCA-NA (or other National Hobie Class Association. All skippers participating in the HCA Points Regatta portion of this event must be paid members of the HCA-NA. Exhibition classes are not required to be HCA-NA members to participate.

### Equipment

All NAC Class boats will be weighed and inspected prior to competing. Each NAC Class may elect to waive weigh-in if that class agrees unanimously. Inspection is mandatory and it is the responsibility of each skipper to have their boat weighed (if necessary) and inspected at the event site by the Official Weigh Master. All HCA Points Regatta skippers have the responsibility of making certain their boats meet the requirements of the IHCA rules governing each of their respective classes.

### Competitor's Insurance

Each Competitor must show proof of liability insurance with a minimum coverage of \$100,000 (USD) with valid coverage for organized racing in the Southwester United States. Competitor's proof of insurance and coverage must be available for review at registration.

### Sailing Instructions

The Sailing Instructions will be made available at registration

### **Prizes**

Awards will be presented to the top 25% of pre-registrants (30 days prior to the event) in each class at a minimum. Other awards will be presented in special categories meriting recognition.



There is no Travel Visa required to enter or leave Baja Calif. when traveling to San Felipe.

For those sailors who have not been to San Felipe before, the following is some information that may be useful.

General Safety: The Mexican authorities make a great effort to make our visit to San Felipe safe and enjoyable, but you are reminded that traveling in Mexico is not travel in the United States. Additional precautions should be taken, use common sense. The customs and culture are different and behavior that is common in the USA may not be acceptable or may be misinterpreted by the Mexican people. Act responsibly, do not make yourself a target, do not drink to excess, and do not go out alone late at night. When driving, make a complete stop at all "ALTO"s (STOP signs).

Insurance & Documents: Vehicle liability insurance is required by Mexican Law. Our sponsor "Insurance4Mexico.net" offers very competitive prices & is available on-line 24/7. Or, it can be purchased from an agent on either side of the border. Mexican Customs Officers will likely verify ownership of vehicles, boats and trailers. You will need current registrations and copies of titles for all vehicle(s), trailer(s), & boat(s). If you are using or bringing a vehicle, trailer or boat that is not registered in your name, you need to have a notarized letter of permission from the owner. NOTE: Over the past year, Mexican Customs Officers have become more formal, checking vehicle, boat and trailer registrations. Don't make the long drive without these papers or you may be turned around at the border.



# Thisold • LOOLE Non-skid Repair - Part 2

n the last issue of the *HOTLINE* we covered making a mold of the Hobie non-skid texture using RTV silicone. There are other methods and materials to make molds from, but I've found the RTV silicone to be the easiest to make and use.

To get to the point where you are ready to replace the non-skid, the damaged area must be repaired & prepped first (below). This may include re-spraying all the smooth gel coat areas adjacent to the non-skid repair. This is shown in photos 1 and 2. Spraying gel coat was covered in the July / August HOTLINE.


Next, you'll want to take your new mold and do a "fit check". The mold you use must be larger than the non-skid area you want to replace. During the fit check, you need to find the lines in the existing non-skid pattern, and line up the straight edge of your mold to them. This is shown in photos 3, 4, and 5. The texture non-skid pattern lines on the deck of your Hobie are parallel to the center line of the hull. (Photo 6)



After you are satisfied with both the size of your mold and the fit check, tape off the area you want to replace. This is shown in photos **7** and **8**. I've found it takes a minimum of three layers of tape (3M Scotch brand) to get the finished non-skid to have the correct thickness where it touches the smooth areas. To trim any excess tape away as you build the layers, try using a good quality X-ACTO\* knife blade and a steady hand. To get the new non-skid to blend in with the original do not use tape in the areas of the blending (feathering). If you look closely at photo **7**, you'll see the piece of blue tape (perpendicular to the hull centerline) is away from the blending area which is about six inches closer to the bow. The tape is there to help line up the mold – remember the fit check?

With the fit check and taping finished it's time to get ready to apply the gel coat. The supplies you'll need for this step should include: a roll of tape; a couple of one inch wide throwaway camel hair paint brushes; an adequate amount of gel-coat (w/catalyst) to coat the repair area about 1/8 inch thick; sticks, rulers and weights to hold the mold to the contours you want. It's always good to have some acetone for cleanups.

With your gel-coat properly catalyzed, use a paint brush to coat the area being re-textured. This can be a fairly heavy coating, but be sure to coat evenly, and keep an eye out for hairs from the brush falling out. After you have an even coat of gel-coat laid down, take the mold and very carefully fit it in place on top of the fresh gel-coat, exactly where you want it to be. Now, very carefully, lift the mold off the repair area, and note the material transfer from the repair area to the mold. With the mold upside down (on a drop-cloth, or piece of waxpaper) brush more gel-coat onto the mold



where the material had transferred to, thoroughly coating the surface.

Now, reposition the mold on top of the repair area exactly where you want it to be. To avoid air bubbles, it's best to position one end of the mold to the repair area, then lowering the mold to the surface as you work your way to the opposite end.

With the mold now in position, it needs to be secured in place to avoid moving, or slipping. To secure the mold in place and in the contours you want, use tape, sticks, rulers, and possibly small weights as shown in photos **8**, **9** and **10**. CAUTION- use only enough downward pressure with the tape, sticks and weights to get the mold to gently touch the edges of the tape. Too much pressure may cause the uncolored fiberglass to be visible through the new gel-coat. With the new mold held in place, set the excess catalyzed gel-coat aside in a plastic container to cure.

Monitor the excess gel-coat as it cures. Cure times will vary with location, temperature, humidity and the amount of catalyst used. Normally, 15 – 22 drops of catalyst per liquid ounce of gel-coat is adequate. However, different brands, or colors of gel-coat may require different ratios of catalyst.

After about an hour of cure time, carefully lift up one corner of the mold and check the new gelcoat's cure state. If the mold lifts away from the new gelcoat, continue lifting it (slowly and carefully) away from the repair area. With the mold removed, carefully remove the tape from around the non-skid as shown in photo .

With the mold and tape removed (below), check the new non-skid for any flaws or imperfections. With the gel-coat still curing make any minor corrections if needed. When your sailing friends see the final repair you should get a "Wow, that looks great!"

# The 2009 US SAILING Multihull Championship Jake and Alex's Excellent Adventure

his year's U.S. Sailing Youth Multihull Championships were held at the Alamitos Bay Yacht Club in Long Beach. 

### FROM THE YOUTH PROGRAM DIRECTOR ...

he 2009 Youth Multihull Championship event in January was sailed on the Hobie 16 with spinnaker. This event is the qualifier for the ISAF World Multihull Championships in Brazil this coming July. ISAF chose the Hobie 16 for this event, because the new international youth catamaran, the SL16, is not yet available in South America. Because of that necessary change, we threw our support to this event by backing seven HCA member youth teams to attend and compete. Twelve teams participated. This was a seminal moment for us, providing a chance to show off the strength of our class to US SAILING, as well as bring new youth sailors into the HCA. By that standard, one can confidently conclude that the HCA's effort was a resounding success. We signed up most of the nonmember participants into the HCA. There were numerous expressions of gratitude from our youth, their parents as well as the organizers and spectators at the event. We formed closer ties to many of those who were there from around the country. We can be confident that in the

short term, we will have a number of new young faces at our regattas this year. In particular, many of the youth were happy to learn more about our Youth H16 North American Championships at CORK next July. While only one team will go to Brazil from this event, we will see a number of other teams at CORK that would likely not have been motivated to do so without the support we gave them at Long Beach. We spent from the special projects fund on the order of \$10,000 to pay for lodging, airfares, entry fees and charter boats for these youngsters.

Special recognition goes firstly to all the HCA Youth that attended. They are smart, talented and driven young sailors. It was impressive. Additionally, thanks to the parents and friends who came and helped make it easy to get the youngsters to and from their lodgings, as well as assist at the event, and most of all, provide moral support for the kids. They are Jamie Livingston, Greg and Judy Raybon, Christina Reiss, Catherina Whitehead, Enrique Zenderman and Cary Wessels.

In consequence of this rare moment, it is perhaps time to put a significant effort into building the number of youth teams that will go to Kingston in July. Discussions have begun, and effort is under way to put together boats and assets to make this particular event approach or exceed record attendance for Youth Multihull North American Championships. We are planning a full court press to achieve this lofty goal.

As Youth Program Director, I can think of no other more powerful message we can send to the sailing world of the strength of our class than to get every possible youth team to Kingston, and back them solidly in every possible way. At this time, I would like to thank any of you who have contributed to the HCA youth fund, and would extend a plea and invitation to all HCA members to try and make a contribution at this time in preparation for our upcoming HCA Youth Hobie 16 North American Championships. Stand by for more exciting developments.

# YOUT'S IN COLLEGE

### Is Intercollegiate Sailing in your Child's future?

### Part # 1 The Early years

f you sail Hobies and have kids this article is for you. As a family that has lived through the college search with our oldest daughter and will soon repeat the process with our youngest, we'd like to share some insight to the some times overwhelming process. Finding an affordable, college that is the right fit for your teenager can be a time consuming,

some times stressful process, a little insight from your Fleet friends can make it easier.

It is a no brainer that early preparation is key. Even if your kid has not been a straight A student from Kindergarten it is never to late to hit the books hard. We all know that reading to our children will reap huge benefits, but

sometimes in our daily rush, we don't make the time to make that happen. Some parents feel that the education system in the U.S. is at fault because parents have to spend so many hours helping with homework. Our family has never agreed with that attitude, we have always felt that school is our daughters' "job". As a whole, we believe in a strong work ethic and extra effort is second nature. The assignments, ranging from preschool show-and-tell to battling Honors Algabra, have been a source to bring us closer, working together. It was never about doing the work for them, but always about being there to encourage and support. It sounds good on paper but the trick of the tale is in the actual doing the work, and empathizing when complaining, whining or giving up was easier than getting it done. The hours spent at the kitchen table were a learning process that helped us grow as a family. The Girls learned that hard work

usually pays big dividends. My husband and I found

that you are never to old to learn something new. We celebrated excellent report cards with special dinners out and after years of high honor roll, eventually rewarded our oldest daughter a used Hobie 16.

Throughout high school, it helps to have a heads up on some things that will make your teen more attractive to admissions office. The academic piece of great grades, Advance Placement classes and high SAT & ACT scores is of course very important.

One of the more common topics discussed in a teenagers college search are the PSAT, SAT and SAT subject tests are important test that colleges look at for placement. Again preparation is key, there are many good study guides available. The PSAT–Preliminary Scholastic Assessment Test–is given in October



it can be taken as a Sophomore and again as a Junior. It's used to predict how well students may do on the SAT - Scholastic Assessment Test - and determines eligibility for National Merit Scholarships. The SAT and ACT-American College Test-are taken as Juniors and may be taken again. The SAT is the better known of the two and is made up of Math, Critical Reading and Writing sections.

Another major part of the puzzle to give serious consideration to are extra curricular activities. There is big competition for acceptance to colleges, many more kids today are going on to college. Colleges like to see that your teen is well rounded. Nowadays just being the kid with the highest marks sometimes doesn't cut it. It's our understanding that the more diverse a

student looks the better your chances. One or two things that make you different from your classmates is what admissions offices are looking for, on applications, and in essays it very important that you convey your specific uniqueness. Essays and applications can be very overwhelming to a teenager. Parents need to be supportive and understanding of the "typical teenage" way of doing things. Between disagreeing with every thing an adult suggest, they are busy growing physically and mentally. Hormones are raging; your teen's major focus is on how to fit in with the group and how to be alike everyone else.

Sailing is a wonderfully different sport, i.e. extra-



curricular; overall very few people in the US sail, much less kids in the 16-18 year old age group. Some teens in the country are fortunate to have a sailing team at there high school. College coaches, with varsity teams, look to those schools for recruitment, most of us don't have that luxury. If the

Hobie bug has bitten your teen, pat yourself on the back. You've done them a great service turning them on to a sport that they can enjoy for a lifetime. One of the bigger racers that look good on college applications include Hobie North American Youth Championships. Theses races like the other Championships are not just or the best sailors in the country, there is always tons of room for novice sailors. Most big "Yout" events have plenty of adult support, some times in the form of a coach boat that will help the kids in the back of the pack. The U. S. Sailing Youth Mulithull Championships are another event that can be neat experience. These types of major events qualify for the Hobie Class Associations' Grant Program, so there is some Class funding available. The US Sailing

Youth Mulithull Championship is January 17-19 in Long Beach Californian. The Hobie North American Youth Championships are in Kingston, Ontairo, Canada July 17, 18 and 19.

One very good suggestion for a Hobie kid is to sail, "out of the box" and get some experience in a small monohull. Yacht clubs have sailing schools that are often open to the public. Dingy racing is a whole other world. It is a great idea to for your Hobie sailing teen to spend some time sailing/racing dinghies. Club 420s and FJs, are two person 12 ft. monhulls just some of classes that are raced on the college circuit.

Next issue we will get into some of the details of how sailing can effect your choice for college. In the mean time...do your homework!
