The event will be governed by the rules as defined by the 2009-2012 Racing Rules of Sailing, except as modified by this NOR and the Sailing Instructions. For all classes, RRS 44.1 (Penalties at the Time of an Incident) will be changed so that a one-turn penalty shall be required for a breach of Part 2 Rules.

All crew members must be current members of the IHCA. Hobie 16 competitors must be under age 21 on August 2, 2010. Hobie Wave competitors must be under 16 years of age on August 2, 2010. This modifies IHCA Rule 17.7.



# IHCA Approves Wave Rudder Proposal

Wave racers know that the stock rudders are OK, but stiffer rudders like the new EPOs are much better for racing. Ambiguity in the class rules and design changes by Hobie Cat made it unclear whether replacing original rudders with a higher performance rudder was class legal or not.

The HCA-NA put forth a proposal to clear up this ambiguity and the IHCA has approved the Hobie Wave rule change:

- 1.1 Rudder blades\* and rudder assemblies\*\* shall be stock as supplied by the HOBIE CAT CO. Only Hobie Cat Company supplied after market rudders\* are allowed to replace stock rudders.
- \* Defined as Hobie Wave and Hobie 16 rudder blades.
- \*\* Defined as the original Hobie Wave system and the Hobie Wave EZ Loc system.
- NOTE: As of the time of this writing (February 2010) only aftermarket rudders are available that fit the old style rudder castings.

#### **Big Bear Cancelled**

The Big Bear Lake Regatta has been a staple of the Division 2 regatta circuit for many years. The regatta has been cancelled this year due to high permit fees - \$135 per boat.

Hobie Cat regattas are a low-impact, green use of natural resources. Park managers may have incorrect perceptions of just what a Hobie Cat regattas are. They may envision hundreds of boats and sailors running ampant - which would have been correct 25 years ago.

Don't take your water access for granted! Maintain a good relationship with the permitting authority. Make sure they know what an asset a Hobie regatta can be.





ots of old Hobie 16s are looking for a new lease on life. Some of these old boats can be had for less than a tenth the cost of a new boat, making them attractive donations for junior and youth sailing programs. However, before letting the kids go play, the boat needs to be thoroughly inspected, repaired and tuned up. Other than the obvious fiberglass repairs, which we've covered in previous This Old Hobie columns, the most common problem with old Hobie 16s and 14s is wear and slop in the trampoline frame. Over the years, salt water and galvanic corrosion can seriously weaken the pylons and loosen the framing members. If you can lift one bow a foot before the other bow starts to move, it needs work. A stiff boat is much more responsive to the wind and steering inputs. In other words - it's more fun to sail! In this column, we'll cover how to make repairs to the hull pylons and gluing the boat together to make it stiff.

Tools: heavy file, wire wheel, clamps, HTS-2000 sticks, Mapp gas torch



Remove the trampoline frame from the hulls, remove the foam plugs from the pylons and inspect the pylons thoroughly. Typical problems include wallowed out bolt holes, cracks and worn down walls on the extrusion (1) and 2). You'll need to remove all the dirt and corrosion before repairing. Use a wire wheel in a drill or angle grinder to clean the inside and outside of the pylons. Use coarse sandpaper to get those areas where the wire wheel won't reach. Use a Dremel tool to "V" out the cracks to give the repair something to grip. Vacuum up the dust and wipe with a solvent (acetone or MEK) to remove any grease or remaining dust. Do this in a well-ventilated area and allow to dry thoroughly before proceeding.

The pylons on this boat were in bad shape – the wallowed out bolt holes and cracks called for reinforcing. The best reinforcing plates can be cut from old masts (stubs left over from Comptip conversions) or pylons from a junked boat (3). They're already curved and will fit well. If those aren't available, then use ½" aluminum plate from the hardware store. We popped in some ½" stainless steel rivets into the new pieces below where the corner casting sits to hold them in place (9). This also helped keep the new pieces in place while brazing. Clamp the outer end to get good contact for brazing (4).

Aluminum can be brazed with HTS-2000 brazing rods (available from <a href="www.AluminumRepair.com">www.AluminumRepair.com</a>) and a Mapp gas torch, available from your local hardware store (5). Follow the instructions, especially the part about tinning with the wire brush. Use wet rags to keep the fiberglass hull from heating up and burning or cracking (6). Keep the pylons horizontal to prevent the molten brazing from running out. On this boat, we did repairs on each side of each pylon - that's



a total of eight new pieces that had to be soldered in. While each new piece was cooling, we would move on to another pylon so to keep the pylons from becoming too hot for the hulls. We also filled the old bolt holes and cracks to solidify the new pylon (7).

Once the pylon structure repairs are completed, you can replace the foam plugs inside them, or use an expanding spray urethane foam (Great Stuff) to fill the pylons. Don't forget about the vent tube in the front pylons! On our boat, the top of the pylons were almost crushed inward, so after the foam cured, we cut out the top ¾" of foam to fill with mill fiber thickened epoxy (8). Photo 9 shows the finished pylon repair with all the repairs ground smooth.

Gluing the frame together sounds like a drastic, irreversible act, and in some respects – it is. However, on an old boat, the benefits far outweigh the hassle of taking the boat apart later.

Remove the castings from the crossbars by drilling *just the heads* of the rivets off with a *sharp* ½" drill. Knock the tails in with a ³/16" punch or a Phillips head screwdriver. On the front castings, you'll need to completely remove the dolphin striker nuts. Inspect the castings for any cracks or defects.

Assuming the castings are all good (replace any cracked ones), thoroughly clean the pylon, sidebar and crossbar sockets just like you did with the pylons before brazing. Same treatment for the ends of the crossbars and sidebars. Get the corrosion off so the epoxy has a good, clean surface to grip to.

While the rear corner castings are off, it's a good time to replace

the main traveller car. Tape it to the center of the track so it won't get epoxy on it. While you're protecting things from epoxy, tape some news paper around the pylons (10).

Mix up a batch of epoxy resin (we like WEST System products) and mix in enough colloidal silica (WEST 407) until it has the consistency of peanut butter. Use a wooden tongue drepressor to spread an 1/8" thick layer inside the crossbar socket of a casting. Slide the casting on the crossbar and clean up any epoxy that squishes out. Repeat for the other three castings. Put new rivets in their holes, but don't pull them yet. Keep moving now you'll need to finish the framing and pull the rivets before the epoxy cures completely.

Hobie Cat does not recommend gluing the sidebars with epoxy, since they are not structural and flex quite a bit. Gluing them with 3M 5200 gives them the flexible joint they need without overstressing the corner casting.

On a level surface, frame up the boat, using a bead of 5200 on the sidebar connections and epoxy on the pylons like you did with the crossbars. Square the boat using a diagonal purchase (11) until the diagonal measurements from bow tang hole to rudder pin hole are equal. Make sure the bows are Pull the casting rivets and make sure the bows and sterns are level. Recheck the diagonal measurements again. Clean up any oozes with acetone and paper towels (12 and 13). Let sit overnight to completely cure. Drill new pylon bolt holes and replace the bolts - you're done!

With the frame completely solid, next time, we'll rehab the rudder system.













Friday was a beautiful day, if a little short in the wind department. Soothing balm for sailing-starved Northerners who were putting together their (sometimes new) equipment. After a long day of setting up and testing, competitors were treated to Gulf Coast home-style cooking and entertainment. Sailors were lulled to sleep that night to the sounds of the third shifts at the Pascagoula shipyards.

Four, long races on Saturday in 15 – 20 kts were overshadowed by the forecast for that night and Sunday. An approaching frontal system was pushing a lot of rain and wind in our direction. All during dinner it poured and poured some more. Nervous campers tried to assess the damage from the safety of the clubhouse. They were not looking forward to a cold, wet, noisy night in a flogging tent. Not to worry,

though - SRYC members made sure that everyone had a dry, warm place to sleep that night. Five of us ended up sleeping on the signal boat! (With a heater!)

Sunday tossed up wind and lots of it. Combined with record cold temperatures, everyone was happy that racing would be called off. The soggy messes - formerly tents - of the night before were cleaned up, packed up and headed north by early afternoon. We look forward to some more Southern hospitality next year!

# Commentary - The Decline of Hobie Sailing



...and How We Can Fix It by Gordo Bagley, HCA-NA Junior Program Chair

ver the years, there has been much debate regarding the Hobie One Design (HOD) Policy. It appears that some sailors want to lay blame for the decline in participation at Hobie regattas at the feet of this policy. In my opinion, the success of catamaran sailing, both recreationally and as a racing sport are dependent on one thing only. It is dependent on people getting up and doing something to make things happen. I've been listening to people argue the HOD Policy on both sides, and while they've pointed out merits either way, in my view all that effort has been a distraction. The discussion has also had a very negative effect on morale within the HCA in general. Personally, I strongly believe that changing the policy would have minimal effect on attendance, and represents a quick fix with no long term upside. And, at the risk of seeming hypocritical, I don't care if it gets changed, though many of my closest friends within the class care a great deal. The HOD Policy is not the biggest problem by a long shot.

The most profound comment that I've heard is that we are "rotting from the bottom up", and I couldn't agree more.

Having raced considerably within Division 2 and 3, as well as several North Americans, and associated with what I view as a diverse crowd of very competent Hobie Class racers, there has been a great deal of success to observe that deserves notice. On the other hand, there are things under the surface that do not serve to promote or make attractive this sport we love.

The first problem, and in my view the biggest that seems readily observable is local, at the grass roots. It is in the decline of Hobie Fleet participation, and in the lack of fleet fun sails, keeping of current lists, the ferreting out of catamaran owners. We need to communicate with them, plan recreational events to

include them, and build up fleet communities where catamaran owners can enjoy their boats among other enthusiasts. It is the building of catamaran communities with events outside of racing that is failing. That is what was successful before, and which has been in the greatest decline. Yes, a far greater decline than HCA racing.

Serious racers are focused on getting to the structured division events. They are focused on honing their skills among the best racers. They have their own language, social structure, rapport, as well as banter and trash talk. However, they are not universally focused on fleet building. Statistically, and in most of North America, Hobie racers are indeed fast approaching that point where only a few can applaud their achievements on the water, as has been said. In some localities, it is difficult to find places to make fleet events happen. But with persistence and determination, there are places. This myopic view of the decline in Hobie racing, and in promotion of the racing scene is sighting beyond the mark.

Racing is the pinnacle of catamaran sailing prowess, and it is a small minority of catamaran owners who end up embracing it. Proof of this was a stunning statistic I learned from one of our largest Hobie dealers in the west that only 10% of his sailing revenues come from Hobie racers. The rest are recreational sailing revenues. So, if we focus our efforts toward the recreational sailors, build up our fleets with fun recreational activities, then we will glean the few who have the drive to become racers and build the class. Without a grass roots effort of this kind, the decline will continue unabated. I think that it is time to take a hard look at ourselves, and where our focus is with respect to catamaran sailing in general. In my view, attendance at HCA regattas has

grown in the Southwest, but newcomers are relatively few. We've had good turnout this past season, but it is obvious that the same faces are predominant. There is nothing wrong with that, but perhaps each of us needs to do a little soul searching. It could be time to refocus at least a portion of our effort away from the racing, and towards building the grass roots with more emphasis on local fleets. We need to put together some attractive recreational events for the general public. I'm personally committed to doing that in the desert Southwest. As luck would have it, there is some fertile ground here. Obviously, with a change in focus, it may bring a further short term decline in attendance, which is something of a problem.

Perhaps fleets planning regattas may wish to promote a parallel fun sail and social alongside the racing. If a significant amount of outside catamaran and other sailors were invited, with HC racers aware that with a higher purpose of class growth in mind, they will invest some time in joining a cat community event.

Secondly, each of us needs to look at how we behave toward newcomers. Certainly, it takes time for some to adjust to our culture and the rigors of racing, particularly if they are completely new to sailing and slow to rise through the ranks. While we applaud and revel in attracting top racers who immediately show their prowess on the course, we need to look at every newcomer as a gold nugget in the scheme of things. We need to recognize and make it fun for them, whether it is with our greeting or how we structure our events. Truly, I've felt the coolness of some of the elite racers when first coming on the scene. It could just be me, but it seems that respect and friendly behavior was not soon forthcoming, except from a few. Some have been rude on the course. Chewing out a newcomer for mistakes during the racing really turns them off. Racing is agonizing for the newcomer who has little experience. B, C and Novice fleet isn't enough to keep them returning, unless the numbers substantially grow. We probably need to look at the first year people particularly worthy of special awards and treatment, however we can. Extra effort on a personal level is merited and needs to be maintained. People appreciate attention, and we need to pay very, very special attention when a new face arrives on the scene. I fantasize about screwy initiation rites for the newcomers, recognition at trophy time, and a long term effort to nurture the new racer. However, none of this really matters if the grass roots effort of building catamaran communities is lacking. We will continue to attract few, and loose a like amount through attrition.

The biggest bonus of the Havamega event, as an example, is the amount of people responding to the spectacle at Lake Havasu. As a result we've had interest from a dozen newcomers. I'm grateful to everyone who came to Havasu. Now, I've got the task of welcoming them, and creating an environment that will embrace their interest. It is not easy, but that is where we need to start. We've already a core group of a dozen Hobie owners, who have no interest in racing YET! Now, the fleet members have to bring them into our community of cat sailing enthusiasts and nurture their interest so that we may encourage a few who have the drive to dive into the HCA racing scene. It is a tall order, but does look promising. Stand by on that note.

Lastly, it is clear that every region has its own obstacles, problems and challenges to building catamaran sailing communities. There is no one size fits all program. It requires "out of the box" thinking and a measure of improvisation. Division Chairs, Fleet Commodores and the existing Hobie cat racing community have to think and plan according to their own regions specific challenges. There are already some successes. I've always felt a great deal of gratitude for Fleet 51's efforts to encourage my involvement in Hobie Class Association racing. They were sensitive to the difficulties of introducing this sport to someone and setting a tone that would be nurturing. I noticed right away that they were very careful to make it fun so that I might not get discouraged. My first race at the San Diego Classic in the summer of 2002 had four C-fleeters competing. I came in last, but still got a 4th place trophy. It was great!

This commentary is already too long, yet still I could say a great deal more. I do hope that we can find a way throughout North America to begin rebuilding our fleets, with the eventuality that we glean those few who have the drive and desire to join the great level of competition that HCA racing provides. In the future, hopefully, many families will look to it as a new resource for healthy, fulfilling recreational and sporting pursuit for their youngsters.

# **HCA Youth Grants**

#### Purpose of the Youth Grant

The purpose of the Youth Grant shall be to assist Junior and Youth sailors in attending Championship Hobie Cat events, including, but not limited to:

- Youth events sanctioned by the Hobie Class Association of North America
- Youth events sanctioned and organized by the International Hobie Class Association and held in conjunction with other IHCA Worlds events

These Youth Grants shall be issued without financial obligation on the part of the receiving teams, however, the Youth Grants shall be subject to the terms and conditions as set forth in these guidelines.

#### **Grant Request Guidelines**

The following parameters are those that have been set forth by the HCA Executive Council as the minimum criteria to be met by youth teams wishing to apply for a financial grant for attending eligible events.

- Both skippers and crews must be HCA members.
- Skippers must sail in at least three (3) HCA-sanctioned events during the qualifying season prior to petitioning for a grant. Exceptions may be made at the Council's discretion when seasonal considerations justify

such action. They may sail as a skipper or crew in those events.

Teams must submit the following documents to apply for an HCA Youth Grant:

- 1) An essay explaining why they should receive the Grant.
- 2) A resume of sailing training and experience.
- 3) Planned expenses for the event in question.
- 4) A list of HCA sanctioned regattas attended in the current year and finish positions.
- 5) A personal reference (parent or coach, for example) must be named to provide assistance in administration, disbursement and management of the Youth Grant.

At the conclusion of the event the following must be submitted:

- A detailed expense report outlining expenditures and disbursement of the Youth Grant monies, signed by the reference individual.
- An article about their experience in the event in question, to subsequently be submitted to the HOTLINE through the HCA Youth Chairperson.

#### **Selection Process**

All Youth Grant requests shall be submitted to the current HCA Youth Chairperson 60 days prior to the event. No requests subsequent to that date will be considered for that year.

Youth Grant requests shall be reviewed by the HCA Council and awards to qualified teams shall be announced a minimum of 30 days prior to the event. To be considered for a Youth Grant, all information requested must be provided by the due date, without exception.

Youth Grants shall be awarded based on several factors, including but not limited to: funds available, number of requests received, needs of the individual teams, and requirements of established youth programs serving a number of Youth teams.
